COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

The Commissioners of Sullivan County submit the following report, embracing an account of the transactions at the County Farm, by the Superintendent, with a list of the paupers supported at the farm, the number of weeks each was so supported and a statement showing the cost per week of each. The report also shows the expense of supporting and aiding County Paupers in the several towns, and the total pauper expense for the year, which, under the present system, is the largest item of expense to the County, requiring the strictest watchfulness and economy in its management consistent with the comfort and welfare of the paupers.

One of the most serious obstacles in the management of this department of the county affairs arises from the unwillingness of those asking for aid to go to the County farm. Could all county paupers be supported at the farm the expense would be very much less and the condition of many far better.

Four persons are now and have for some time been supported at the Asylum for the Insane. It is believed that with a comparatively small outlay, to provide suitable apartments and accommodations, these could be equally well cared for and supported at the County farm, at a very much less cost than is now incurred at the Asylum.

The County Farm has been under the superintendence of Mr. and Mrs. K. J. Wilson, since April 1st. 1879. They have shown a fitness for this responsible position, caring well for the paupers and exercising a constant watchfulness over the interests of the County.

There has been expended about \$ 500, at the farm during the past year, for repairs, in shingling the house and L occupied

by the superintendent and his family, in building a reservoir, and in relaying a portion of the aqueduct, which expense is all included in the current expenses at the farm.

Upon the financial standing of the County the Commissioners, in their report for the year 1876, remarked as follows :

“Of the bonded indebtedness of the County, \$2,500.00 was canceled at maturity, leaving an unpaid balance of \$5,200.00 of which \$2,300.00 will mature on the 1st of April 1877. There will also fall due during the month of November next, for repairs and enlargement of the jail, a balance of \$2,600.00, fifteen hundred dollars of the cost of these repairs having been already paid from the funds in the Treasurer’s hands and included in the disbursements from the Treasury shown above.

It can hardly be expected that the amount now remaining in the Treasury will satisfy this demand and meet the current expenses of the County for the ensuing year. To provide for any deficiency that may arise from this source and the increased pauper expense under the law of 1875, it will be necessary to resort to a temporary loan which we think may be met from the revenue of the following years, without any material increase of the County tax”.

While the Commissioners are gratified in being able to congratulate the taxpayers of the County upon the attainment of this desirable result, as shown by the accompanying report of the County Treasurer, they are not unmindful that the same vigilance and watchfulness will be justly exercised over their management of the affairs of the County, and the same economy demanded at their hands in the future as in the past. The County Convention, at its last session, in June, 1879, voted to raise the sum of twenty-three thousand dollars, as a county tax for the year 1880, and twenty-one thousand dollars, for the year 1881. It is hoped that with an economical and prudent management of the affairs of the County, these appropriations will meet the ordinary County expenses.
