



PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Commissioners of Sullivan County:—

GENTLEMEN:—I have the pleasure of presenting to you my annual report as Physician to the County Almshouse.

It is remarkable how little sickness there has been among the inmates, even the old people passing through the severe winter without trouble. There have been no contagious diseases during the year except the chicken-pox among the children. The building is properly heated and well ventilated, the drainage and sewerage are carefully attended to, cleanliness prevails throughout; in short, the sanitary condition of the institution is excellent. The food is nourishing and wholesome and the supply abundant.

The insane are properly cared for and their department in good condition. There have been a few surgical cases during the year, fractures, etc. All are now doing nicely.

Some of the inmates, and especially the older ones, have a great aversion to water. Mrs. Wilson has informed me that it is almost impossible to get some of them to bathe. Now I recommend that it be made one of the rules of the institution that each inmate shall bathe at least once a week in summer and once in two weeks in the winter. Personal cleanliness is conducive to good health.

There have been one birth and four deaths during the past year. Birth—Robert E. Phelps, Oct. 14th, 1882. Deaths—Clarissa Whittemore, May 12th, 1882, aged 81 years; cause of death, old age. Johanna Sawyer, Oct. 14th, 1882, aged 53 years; cause of death, heart disease. Milan W. Chatterton, Apr. 2d, 1883, aged 60 years; cause of death, pneumonia. Henry Jones, Mar. 14, 1883, aged 26 years; cause of death, epilepsy.

I have endeavored to do everything possible for the relief and comfort of the sick, and in every instance have been ably seconded by the Superintendent and family.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Commissioners of Sullivan County:—

GENTLEMEN:—By your pleasure I have been intrusted with the religious interest of the County Alms House for the past year, and the work has been performed according to my best judgment and ability. The service has been rendered agreeable by the co-operation of the Superintendent and his family who have afforded me every facility for its performance, not only in putting the room in order, but also gathering the inmates, as far as practicable, at the hour of service. Also the inmates themselves have kindly welcomed me, both at the public services and in the calls made at their rooms. Some of them are very constant in their attendance upon the Sabbath meetings, and have warmly expressed their appreciation of the religious privileges which the moral sense of the people of the county has placed within their reach.

Friends of the institution in the neighborhood have, with considerable effort on their part, been present to enliven the religious services with sacred song, thereby adding much to their usefulness and interest. Both on my own account and in behalf of all concerned I wish to express gratitude for this assistance.

The sanctity of the Sabbath is properly maintained in the house. Visiting parties are not received, nor is the house open to inspection on that day, except to such as have friends there whom they especially desire to see. It may be proper to add that in the faithful care and efficient management it would be difficult to find better parties than are those in the present superintendence.
