COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

The Commissioners of Sullivan County submit their Annual Report, showing the transactions at the County Farm and Alms House, together with the reports of the other County Officers, for the year ending May 1, 1884.

The house connected with the Jail was found to be in an unsafe condition, and has undergone thorough repairs, at an expense of about thirteen hundred dollars, including repairs on the Court House, during the year.

We would call the attention of the tax payers of the County to the several reports of the County Officers for information in regard to the transactions in their several departments, and especially to the Treasurer's report, which shows the finances to be in a sound condition, the County being free from debt with a cash balance of \$8314.23 in the Treasury, besides the County property, consisting of the Court House and Jail in Newport and the County Farm and Personal Property in Unity, all in good repair and condition.

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable County Commissioners of Sullivan County:—

GENTLEMEN :—As it is customary to report annually the condition of affairs in relation to the sick at the County Farm, I therefore beg to submit to you my report for the year ending April 30th, 1884.

As has been known for some time the facilities for caring for the sick at this institution are very inadequate. The building itself is not suitable to accommodate the sick. There are no rooms set apart for that purpose. Every sick person lives in the noise and confusion, with no especial nurse but cared for by all. The ventilation is very bad and consequently the air is very impure. The building is heated by wood fires in various parts of it, so the temperature is not even. There should of course be good ventilation and a good even temperature maintained by steam heat, and there should also be facilities for bathing, and I hope all these things will be looked after in the new building that is to be erected.

Personal cleanliness above all things should be enforced. Considering the condition of things it is wonderful that there is no more sickness. The winter has been severe and the sickness among the older people has been greater than usual. The younger people have escaped with but little sickness, with the exception of an epidemic of measles, there having been a number of quite severe cases, but no deaths.

The department for the insane has been conducted satisfactorily. These poor unfortunates have been made as comfortable as possible.

The superintendent and family have endeavored to keep everything in perfect order and perfectly clean. They have in all cases aided me in the care of the sick and have as directed done everything possible for their relief and comfort.

There was no birth at the County Farm during the year.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Commissioners of Sullivan County:

The relations of the Chaplain with the County Alms House for the year just past have been generally agreeable to all parties. The Superintendent and his family have been interested in the religious interests of the institution and while they afforded all requisite facilities to the Chaplain in his work, at the same time they used all proper endeavors to secure the attendance of the inmates on the public services, and were always present themselves. They also kept me informed of any that were sick that I might visit them in their rooms.

The institution is a little world of itself, presenting a great variety of people in a small space. Of course not all of them were equally pleased or profited by the efforts of the Chaplain, but many of them seemed to await with anticipated pleasure his usual visits. Some especially who were confined to their rooms by sickness or infirmity seemed to be profited by such instruction and religious exercises as were afforded them privately.

An unusual number of deaths occurred during the year, not from any special malady, but chiefly among those who were aged, and who had been gradually declining during previous years till exhausted nature collapsed at last. These, I think, had all the care and comfort that could be secured for them in an institution of this character.

During my three years of service I saw much to commend and little to reprehend in the management of the affairs of the house.
