## COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

—o—

The Commissioners of Sullivan County submit their annual report for the year ending April 30, 1885, containing a summarized account of their transactions which concern the County, in connection with the reports of the other County Officers, and the Chaplain, Physician and Superintendent of the County Farm.

The County Farm has been in charge of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Bailey, as Superintendents, during the past year. The erection of a new building and other extensive improvements at the farm have imposed upon them a large amount of extra labor and responsibility, all of which has been met and performed promptly and successfully.

The County Convention of June, 1883, authorized the erection of a new building for the better accommodation and care of the insane paupers and also the introduction of steam for warming the almshouse and other buildings connected therewith, all at a cost not exceeding the sum of eight thousand dollars. In accordance with their direction, and to supply a much needed improvement, a building has been erected, 36x42 feet, containing eighteen rooms, besides bath rooms and closets, with all needful arrangements for the health and comfort of this unfortunate class of persons. After occupying this building for a term of nearly six months the Commissioners are confident that it is thoroughly adapted to the uses for which it was designed and constructed.

The steam heating apparatus was furnished and put in by Mr. E. H. Randall of Concord. This improvement is found to contribute much to the comfort of all connected with the institution, while the risk from fire is much less, without any increase in the consumption of fuel.

These improvements have been made at a cost of \$6,552, including something more than \$1,000 furnished in labor by the help employed at the farm, board of mechanics and workmen, and team work, freighting, materials, excavating, etc.

The reports of the several County Officers contain all needful information in their several departments.

The property owned by the County, consisting of the Court House and Jail, in Newport, and the County Farm, in Unity, has been kept in good repair and condition, with additions and improvements above reported.

The County Convention held June, 1883, voted to raise the sum of \$20,000 for each of the years 1884 and 1885, as a County tax. The expenses of the County for the past year (including the improvements at the Farm), have been met from this appropriation, and the balance in the treasury May 1st, 1884, amounting to the sum of \$8,314.23, leaving a balance now in the treasury of \$2,332.64, as shown by report of the Treasurer.



## PHYSICIANS' REPORT.



*To the Honorable County Commissioners of Sullivan County:*

GENTLEMEN:—We beg leave to offer the following as our report as attending physicians at the Sullivan County Farm for the year ending April 30th, 1885.

The health of the inmates during the year has been very good, no serious illness or diseases of an infectious or contagious character occurring. Complaints have been chiefly of a chronic nature, or those produced by their previous mode of living. But four deaths have occurred during the year, three males and one female, all white, and all about the age of seventy-five; death in every case was due to senile causes.


